Minutes of the 45th Annual General Meeting. March 13th 2023

Drinks and nibbles were offered to members on arrival as they took their places.

The Chairman was pleased to welcome 43 members to the meeting.

There were no apologies.

Minutes of the 44th AGM were displayed on the screen and there were some paper copies.

The Chairman's report outlined the society's activities post the pandemic.

The next AGM meeting 11th March 2024

Mr. Brian Hunt of the Rotary Club gave a very well researched talk about two men from Sonning who were both awarded the Victoria Cross for gallantry and valour during the South African Boer wars. His interest in the subject had been aroused by coming across the two gravestones in St. Andrews churchyard in Sonning. He traced their family histories and professional military careers and was able to show, in spite of a great unevenness of numbers, how the battles in the Orange Free state were conducted. Many horse drawn wagons were employed and lost in moving supplies across water in a 5 hour battle at Sanna's point. Q Battery chose one officer E.J. Phipps for the Victoria Cross. Brigadier General Edmund John Phipps Thornby received many other medals during his career and these may be seen at the Woolich Museum. He died in 1947.

Similarly, Llewellyn Price Davies was awarded the Victoria Cross at the battle of Blood River Poort in 1901. He had been educated at Marlborough and Sandhurst. After retirement he was part of her Majesty's Bodyguard. He died in 1965 and his medals may be seen in Winchester.

It was rewarding to learn that both men were involved in the community life of Sonning village after their service in the armed forces. Mention is made of them in Parish magazines, the Golf and Cricket clubs, the British Legion, the management of Pearson's Hall and the Home Guard.
